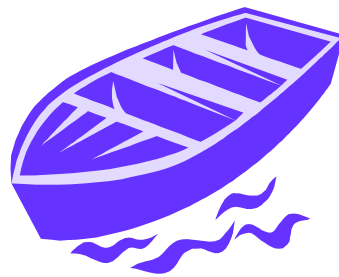

**How do I safely
dispose of...**

**From my boat at
Lake Lanier?**



Preventing the generation of a waste is ALWAYS the best practice...

...especially when the waste may be hazardous to human health or the environment. Make sure to minimize your generation of hazardous products by only buying the amount you will use in one season. If you have a leftover product, give it to someone who will use it before it goes bad. If you have old, unusable products, follow these tips for proper disposal:

Old Gasoline

Contact the Holiday Marina at 770-945-7201.

They will accept up to 10 gallons. However, don't generate it year after year and expect a local marina to dispose of it! Strive to use all you have or give it to someone who will. If it's a quality concern, consider mixing the old gasoline with 7 parts (or more) of new gasoline.



Out-Dated Flares

Lead-Acid Marine Batteries

Recycle at retail stores that sell lead-acid marine or auto batteries. Some local marinas will accept them as well.



Other Batteries

Nickel-Cadmium Batteries are also recyclable locally. Call 1-800-8-BATTERY for recycling locations. Alkaline batteries, although recyclable, are not yet recyclable locally and can be disposed in your regular trash.

Motor Oil

Motor oil can be recycled or properly disposed at some local marinas, most Wal-Marts and quick lube vehicle service centers. For a full list, contact 1-800-CLEANUP or access online at www.ganet.org/dnr/p2ad/hhw



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Fire Extinguishers and Gas Cylinders

As a rule of thumb, buy a refillable cylinder and reuse it as needed. An unwanted refillable cylinder can either be refilled and resold by the manufacturer or, if it's empty, the cylinder can be recycled by a scrap metal dealer (Yellow Pages under "Scrap Metal"). Non-refillable cylinders need to be used for their intended purpose until empty, then recycled or disposed in the



trash as permitted by the recycler, trash hauler, or landfill. Never place a full or partially full gas cylinder in the trash!
